## **Imperfect Competition Syllabus**

Relevant chapters in the text are listed in the course outline below. Read the chapters before the lectures.

Note on textbook: Tirole's textbook is the definitive work on the basics of imperfect competition. A more recent textbook is P. Belleflamme and M. Peitz, *Industrial Organization: Markets and Strategies*, Cambridge University Press, 2010.

<u>Canvas Website</u>: The Canvas website for the course contains my Course Notes and I will post some other handouts there. You will find these things by going to Files (left menu) and then clicking on the obvious file.

<u>Course Description</u>: The course is intended to develop the basic theoretical results concerning markets with imperfect competition. We cover three central topics. First, we examine the exercise of monopoly power, with attention to several issues (examples being rent seeking and price discrimination). Second, we study vertical relationships between firms, when at least one has market power. Last, we study oligopolistic behavior, examining both static and dynamic models.

Grading and Problems: Your course grade will be based on a take-home exam given out early in the week of final exams (week beginning Feb. 20). I will coordinate with the other professors regarding the exact timing. Tirole provides problems throughout the development, coded by one, two, or three stars (with answers). You should attempt/do the one- and two-star problems; of course, try the three stars as you please. I will also provide a couple of problem sets, though these will not be graded.

A student who publishes a recording without written

consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.
