Course Description

In this course, we analyze the education system using theoretical and empirical results developed by economists as well as some history of education policy. We study education policy by asking the type of education we want to produce, how we can produce it, and for whom it should be produced. We learn a few econometric tools needed to test theory and find the effectiveness of any given policy. Relevant theory includes public goods, imperfect competition, human capital vs. signaling, and Tiebout sorting. Other topics include the returns to education, financing, charter schools, the teacher labor market, and higher education.

Textbook/Readings

Most of the required reading will come from the required text:

Michael Lovenheim & Sarah Turner. "Economics of Education", Worth Publishers, 2018.

The book divides into Parts I-IV. Part I (Chapters 1-3) is an overview of the structure of the education market and the empirical tools we use to analyze it. Part II (Chapters 4-7) gives the theoretical framework for education production and investment. Parts III (Chapters 8-12) and IV (Chapters 13-15) go into various topics in Elementary/Secondary and Higher education policy. The book summarizes many empirical papers that test theories or provide evidence about the effectiveness of certain policies. The course will mostly follow the order of the book but will be divided into 5 modules which you can see in the Schedule section.

Grading

Exams 1 & 2 (25% each)

There will be two exams taken during class time on February 16th and April 13th. The exams will be taken in the classroom unless UF policy on in-person classes changes. The first exam will cover Modules 1 and 2. The second exam will cover Modules 3-5 in Module 5 (so non-cumulative). In preference of keeping the dates for these exams set, I will edit the topics covered on the exams if our lectures progress differently. If you know that you will not be able to take one or both exams on those dates during class hours, inform me early so that we can set a different time or date.

Homework & Quizzes (20%)

There will be 10 short homework assignments and 10 quizzes all graded on completion. The typical schedule will be that you are assigned a homework and quiz on Monday that covers the reading and lectures for that week, then the homework and quiz will be due the next Monday at 6pm. The questions for the homework and the quiz will be posted on Canvas, and each student must turn in a single PDF with typed out answers for the homework and complete the quiz. You may collaborate with other students when working on your homework, but you need to list with whom you worked on the PDF. No late homework or quiz will be accepted without an excused absence¹ granted by the instructor. An absence is best cleared with me before class through email, but I will take circumstances into account.

Project (30%)

You will do your own research on a real-world education policy. The full description and rubric is on Canvas. It will be a group project with a 10-15 minute presentation done in class during the last week of the semester.

Recording of Lectures
