ECO 5207 prepares master's students to be literate in macroeconomic topics. We will focus on the business cycle; long-run growth requires its class. Principally, you will become familiar with modern macroeconomic central forces, mechanisms, and frictions driving business cycles. You will learn the microeconomic theory that underpins macroeconomic outcomes. Lastly, you will become equipped to explain and apply the main conclusions of the field and understand which areas we are still determining.

### **Problem Sets**

Problem sets will be assigned most weeks. Problem sets will always be assigned at least a week before they are due. I encourage you to work in small groups to solve the problem sets, but be sure you can understand and solve them individually. The exam problems will reflect - but not exactly resemble - those on the problem sets.

### **Grading**

Problem sets will account for 25% of your grade. The first midterm will account for 25%, the second midterm will account for 25%, and the third midterm will account for 25%. Finally, random attendance checks will be used for the curve of final grades (no clear rules will be made here).

After all the scores are available, I will assign letter grades based on a curve. The specific distribution of the grades will depend on the class's overall performance. Two rules for problem sets. First, your lowest problem set grade will be dropped. Second, I will allow each student one no-questions-asked 48-hour extension for a late problem set if they email me before the deadline. These are lenient policies, so no other extensions or late problem sets will be allowed.

Three rules for midterms. First, I do not allow make-up exams. Second, if you miss one of the midterms due to illness (verified official doctor's notes are required from DRC or Dean of Student Office, and you must let me know at least one day before the exam only through them; I won't reply or agree on any documents send to me directly.), you could allocate the weight equally to the other two without penalty. Third, if you miss one of the midterms voluntarily (you must let me know at least one day before the exam), you could have the weight allocated equally to the other two, but with a penalty of -5 points when calculating the final letter grade (say if you have assignments of 25, missed midterm 1, midterm 2 of 25, midterm 3 of 25, your final grade would be 25 + (25 + 25)\*0.75/0.50 - 5 = 95.).
