Course Description:

This course introduces economic issues related to the environment and policies that can be used to address them. Topics covered in this course include (but are not limited to) the following: Externalities, Open Access Resources, Revealed Preferences, Stated Preferences, Social Choice, Economic Growth and the Environment, Environmental Policy (including Standards, Fees, and Marketable permits), Law and the Environment.

Course Objectives: Students that successfully complete this course will be able to:

- (i) understand some of the major environmental regulations in the United States of America
- (ii) understand different valuation methods for environmental goods
- (iii) identify different types of goods and policies aimed at incentivizing their socially optimal
- (iv) understand the economic implications of different types of environmental policies

Class Modality: This is a fully in-person course. Lectures will not be streamed nor recorded. All exams will take place in person, during our scheduled class times. The exam dates are listed on this syllabus (see Schedule section). All spot quizzes (classwork) are in person during our lecture (times for spot quizzes are not announced in advance). The majority of material is handed out in class. If you miss class, ask a classmate for the material and notes.

Explanation of Classwork Bonus: Students who consistently show up to class on time and complete the required in class assignments are eligible for an attendance-based bonus (Classwork Bonus).

In order to achieve the Classwork Bonus you need to submit 4 spot quizzes. All students who submit 4 spot quizzes will get to choose whether to be graded using the Standard Grading Weight OR the Grading Weight for those who achieve the Classwork Bonus.

If a student goes above and beyond and completes classwork above the 4 spot quizzes they can also opt for the grade scale "Exceeding the Classwork Bonus". For these students: Anything beyond the first 4 spot quizzes will count as attendance boost extra credit (which cannot be made up since it is extra credit meant for encouraging attendance). These will either be extra credits for exam 1 or exam 2 depending on whether they take place before or after Exam 1.

Question: What if my grade is lower with the Classwork Bonus?

Answer: At the end of the term I will calculate your grade both with and without the Classwork Bonus. If your grade is lower with the Bonus, feel free to email me asking me to grade you using the Standard Grading Weight option.

¹ This includes, but is not limited to: in-class quizzes, in-class group work, in-class statistical analysis work, and other in class activities. You must complete 4 of these to achieve the bonus. If you complete 3 or less you will not be eligible for the bonus. If you complete 3 or less due to medical or similar reasons I will be happy to walk you through a medical withdrawal. Note: You will have at least 8 unannounced in-class bonus work opportunities, so there is plenty of time to make these up during unannounced times (given the nature of the attendance bonus).

Make Up Exams

Make-up exams will be arranged *only* for absences that are explicitly covered by the <u>UF</u> <u>Attendance Policy</u>. Whenever possible, you should reach out at least five business days in advance to arrange a make-up exam. Of course, this will not always be possible. Unforeseen absences and emergencies occur and can be excused without such advance notice. In most cases, you will be asked to provide evidence or documentation of an absence that is explicitly excused by the <u>UF</u> <u>Attendance Policy</u>. Absences related to religious holidays and worship do not require this documentation but <u>must be given ahead of time</u> if the holiday date is known ahead of time. Important: Being sick and providing a doctor's note is considered and excused absence. Making a routine doctor's appointment (ex: dental cleaning, check up) is not considered an unforeseen medical emergency/sickness and does not count for an excused absence. Please do not email me asking to excused an exam over a wedding, family dinner, etc. These are not valid excuses to miss an exam.

Make Up Exams will be given at set dates³. Excuses must be provided at most 1 week after the absence.

Exams: There are two exams in this course. These closed-book, closed-note exams will take place in our regularly assigned classroom. Partial credit will be given for partially correct answers. For questions involving math/graphs, points will be deducted if a student has the correct answer but does not show how they arrived at that answer. All answers must include an

explanation unless asked otherwise. If a student arrives 20 minutes or more late to an exam, they will receive a grade of 0 on that exam. Please plan accordingly.

Spot Quizzes / Classwork: We will periodically have in class quizzes / classwork. These are part of your grade iff you are eligible for the Classwork Bonus described earlier in this syllabus. These can only be completed in class individually or in groups of up to 4 students. You must be present in the classroom to be able to submit classwork. If you submit classwork but were not in class, you will get a 0. If you show up after the classwork has started, you cannot submit it. Classwork is due by the end of the class but Canvas is kept open until the end of the day to accommodate students with disabilities. Classwork is always due on Canvas. You can type, upload a picture or document to Canvas. Dates for spot quizzes / classwork will not be announced in advance. Students in the past have used apps such as Camscanner or Dropbox to upload their work. Partial credit will be given for partially correct answers. For questions involving math/graphs, points will be deducted if a student has the correct answer but does not show how they arrived at that answer. All answers must include an explanation unless told otherwise.
