Course description

The course will examine issues in sustainability from an economics perspective with a focus on climate change. A detailed list of topics that will be covered in class is listed in the course topics section of this syllabus. This course deals primarily with the Economics of Climate Change. Important: This course does not count as an economics elective, as it is a 2000 level course but it does count for the Sustainability major and minor². This course has several topics in common with Environmental Economics, but the focus is more on climate change. You will learn material not covered in Environmental Economics, but there is some material in common.

Required Textbook

- 1. "The Climate Casino: Risk, Uncertainty, and Economics for a Warming World" by William Nordhaus. ISBN: 978-0300212648. Note: The paperback version is exactly the same as the hardcopy version and as the e-book version. Any version is fine.

Course Topics and Calendar are available on the last pages of this syllabus. The easiest way to keep up with the course is to attend every lecture. Attendance is expected. If you miss class, it is your responsibility to contact a classmate to figure out what you missed. Office hours cannot be used as a substitute for in-class attendance.

Evaluation of Grades

1. Original Exam weights: For students who do not earn enough bonuses to get the classroom and call-in bonuses

Exam 1: 33%, Exam 2: 33%, Exam 3: 34%.

2. Optional Bonus Exam weight: For students who earn the classroom and call-in bonuses Exam 1: 20%, Exam 2: 20%, Exam 3: 21%, Exam 1 Bonus: 13%, Exam 2 Bonus: 13%, Exam 3 Bonus: 13%.

¹ Office hours are in person. You can try and attend via Zoom by calling (352) 392-5017 and asking me to log into Zoom. However, students who are in the office will be seen first. The Zoom link is listed on our Canvas site.

² In the past, this course was taught as a 4000 level course and did count as an economics elective. However, this is no longer the case because the course is now a 2000 level course. This course does not count as an Economics elective but it does count for the Sustainability major requirements. You should not take this course if you've taken the Quest 2 Climate Change Economic impacts course.

Exams

We will have 3 in-person exams. No notes, books, or electronics of any type are allowed during exams³. When answering short-answer or long-answer questions/exercises, you can only get full credit if you show all your work. I have no way of knowing whether you answered a question correctly if you do not show me how you got there. You will always get partial credit for partially correct work. You cannot take an exam if you arrive more than 50 minutes late. Arriving more than 50 minutes late without an excuse or missing an exam without a valid excuse will result in a grade of 0.

Missed exams: Excuses must be provided within 1 week of the absence. Please use the Canvas form. Travel is not generally a valid excuse to miss an exam (with a few, academic and UF-related exceptions), neither are weddings. Some exam absences will be referred to the DSO for further verification. Excuses due to chronic conditions should be handled by the DRC. From the catalog: "In general, acceptable reasons for absence from or failure to participate in class include illness, serious family emergencies, special curricular requirements (e.g., judging trips, field trips, professional conferences), military obligation, severe weather conditions, religious holidays, and participation in official university activities such as music performances, athletic competition or debate. Absences from class for court-imposed legal obligations (e.g., jury duty or subpoena) must be excused." Note that I require proof for all exam absences and I sometimes check to make sure the proof is real. Also note that weather emergencies only take place when UF (or I) send a message saying UF is closed for weather.

Missing Multiple Exams:

If you miss more than one exam, I can help walk you through Medical Withdrawal.

Optional Classwork Bonuses

We will have two types of classwork bonuses: (1) classwork exercises and (2) classwork call-ins.

- Bonus Classwork Exercises

These are short in-class exercises that can only be submitted on the day they are assigned and if you are in class. The goal is to encourage attendance so only those in class can submit. If you submit any classwork that has not been assigned in class, it will not count towards classwork. If you submit classwork when you were not in the classroom you will not get any credit for it. Again, the whole purpose of these bonuses is to encourage attendance. You are required to be in class to complete classwork. You are required to show up on time to submit classwork. You are required to upload it correctly too (you will not get credit for uploading a corrupt file or the wrong file). If you show up after the roll call you will not be able to submit classwork for that

³ I will provide you with a 4-function calculator. If you take the exam at the DRC you must bring your own 4-function calculator or you can borrow one from me in advance. The only exception is students with disabilities that require electronic accommodations for medically necessary electronics, but I must be notified of this by the DRC. If you are caught communicating with anybody during an exam or using a cell phone of any type, you will be referred to the Dean of Students Office for an honor code violation.

day, even if you are there. There are no make ups for this because it is a bonus opportunity (i.e., extra credit). You will upload your classwork to Canvas on the day of the class. I will not reopen Canvas if you forget, as this is done in class.

- Bonus Classwork Call-Ins

You are expected to attend regularly and participate actively in this course. You are expected to have read the assigned material (listed on the last 2 pages of this syllabus and regularly updated on Canvas) before attending class and to be prepared to answer questions based on the readings and material covered in class. I ask a number of directed questions during the lecture period of the course. Students are selected at random (without replacement until everyone has had their turn) to answer questions based on the readings and class materials. The purpose of these questions is to make sure you are keeping up with the material and comfortable with communicating with me and your classmates. An additional purpose is to enhance class participation. I use timers because I need to keep track of time, not because I want to make anyone nervous/anxious. My goal is never to trick you, it is for you to learn and be comfortable asking questions. You can take a pass if you don't feel comfortable answering a question (note that taking a pass counts as a missed bonus opportunity). You will earn points if your answer is incorrect but on the right track. You will not lose points if you get these wrong, but you do lose the opportunity to earn a bonus. Important: My goal is to foster a nice cooperative learning environment. I will remove your call-in points if you show a lapse in appropriate conduct while a classmate is trying to answer a question. It is never okay to be rude or mock anyone in class. *You can use your notes or powerpoints when answering call-ins. You cannot use AI (I will stand behind you to check).

Important

For each exam: For the Optional Classwork Bonuses to be counted as part of your grade, you will need to have submitted 4 prior to each exam (this includes both submission of classwork and answering call-ins). If you submit less than 4 of the offered bonuses on an exam, you will not get a bonus and will instead have the relevant exam take the original weight. Note that if you exceed 4 bonuses for exam 1 and are missing bonuses for exam 2, I will not move them to the next exam.

Example: If you submit 3 or less bonuses for Exam 1 you will have Exam 1 weighted at 33%. If you submit at least 4 of Exam 1 bonuses, you will be able to weigh Exam 1 as 23% and the bonus as 10%. If you exceed 4 submissions for the relevant exam, I will drop the lowest submissions so only the top 4 are counted. Example: If you have 6 submissions for Exam 2, I will only count your 4 highest. Also note that if the bonus lowers your grade, I can remove it by request (this is extremely unusual). Note that 4 submissions are required for *each* exam. If you meet the bonus for exam 1 but not for exam 2 and 3, your weight will adjust accordingly (i.e., exam 1 will count for 23%, exam 1 bonus for 10%, exam 2 for 33% without a bonus, and exam 3 for 34% without a bonus). In other words, each bonus is calculated independently and calculated based on the number of bonuses achieved on that exam only. Also note that you will get at least 6 opportunities per exam for bonuses (6 opportunities in total for both call ins and classwork, not for each).

Missing a lecture (when there is no exam)

I take attendance in case you medically withdraw. You should always contact me (with proof) if you miss an exam. You should not contact me if you miss a non-exam lecture unless you have something big going on that you think I should be aware of (example: death in family or broken leg). You should get notes from a classmate if you miss a lecture.

Office hours' information and expectations

Extra office hours before exams will be announced in class.

Office hours are for asking clarifying questions, getting help with class exercises or concepts you are struggling with, and discussing personal circumstances when needed. They are not a substitute for missing class and failing to read the required readings. If you miss class, you should get notes from a classmate. I will not re-teach a lecture during office hours but am happy to walk you through areas you are struggling with. Please attend lectures (or get lecture notes) and read the relevant reading before attending office hours

Please note that if you have taken the Climate Change Economic Impacts (Quest 2) course, you will not benefit from taking this course since the topics and textbook are very similar. Also note that this course has several topics in common with Environmental Economics, but it is fine to take this class in addition to Environmental Economics because they cover different material.

Negative externalities / Unregulated markets and externalities, Tipping points, Resistance to reducing GHG emissions, Relevant court cases, Free riding, Net Present Value, Why is climate change difficult to tackle from an economics perspective?, DICE model and other climate change models, Public goods, Evidence of human caused climate change, Direct measurements (Hawaii data), Indirect measurements (ice core data), Uncertainty regarding projections?, Case study on pollution, health and the economy, What tipping points are we concerned about with climate change?, Managed and Unmanaged systems, Optimal Point of Emissions Reductions, Expected Impacts on: Farming, Health, Oceans, etc., Adaptation, Using Economics to Adapt our Models, Challenges with Predictions about the Future, Sea Level Rise (thermal expansion, ice melting, concerns with SLR, what countries are most affected, etc), Ocean Acidification, Hurricanes (hurricane management and costs), Island Nations, Market failures, valuing ecosystems, contingent valuation, Adaptation, Mitigation, Geoengineering, Technologies for reducing CO2, CO2 reduction methods, economic vs. engineering approach, country participation, economic, efficiency, discounting and its effect on calculations., Economic incentives to deal with CO2 externalities (carbon pricing, price signals, etc), Standards, Cap and Trade, Safety Valves,, Allowance Banking, Acid Rain program, Energy Efficiency, Enforcement, border tax adjustment, etc, Economics of innovation
